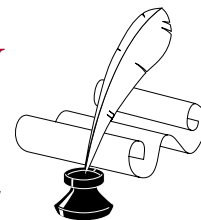

FROM THE DEANS DESK...

JAMES WALDY, DEAN OF FACULTY



As a lifelong educator, I have come to covet those moments which I know will create an indelible and positive impression upon me. They are the stuff of memories and encouragement which make a teacher, director, parent or coach say, "That is why we do this." For me, such experiences are usually associated with amazing excellence or a student overcoming some obstacle in order to perform or achieve. The latter is often linked to a character-driven determination which refuses to let teammates or classmates or fellow thespians down.

I saw it with a junior high football team this past fall as we took the field with only eight players – no substitutes. On three different occasions I looked three different young men straight in their tear filled eyes and said, "We can play short if you need a break." All three times, each injured player said it was okay, he could stay in the game. We won that day. It didn't matter. What mattered was the courage each boy demonstrated by refusing to let his teammates down. Each parent and fan who witnessed that game had a heart filled with positive pride and a quiet confidence that those boys were showing their potential to rise above self to live a life marked by character and conviction.

There have been many similar memories over the past twenty plus years at Cair Paravel: Matt Copeland continuing a football game with a broken bone. Laura Juillerat refusing to leave an overtime basketball game with ankles that forced her to tearfully limp up and down the floor. Jeremy Kelley demanding to stay in a championship soccer game with a broken nose. You don't conjure and force such memories. They come readily to mind as you ask your memory to recall those instances when you have witnessed students overcome their infirmities to advance a cause.

"Playing through the pain" isn't always associated with sports. Kids with character come to school feeling far less than 100%. They happily take their "blood points" and continue participating in retreat activities. They keep riding their bikes up and down hills with saddle sores and cramps. They walk backward off cliffs while praying that the rope won't break. They play their violins with fevers, they sing with sore throats, and they say, "Sure I can help," before they even find out what the task is going to be.

The latest page added to my "heroic memories scrapbook" occurred this weekend as more than a hundred classmates, parents and friends watched Jamie Tague take the stage for four productions of the middle school musical, "The Secret Garden". She should have been at home in bed. By the time the Saturday evening show ended, Jamie had a fever, sore throat, little strength and no voice. Yet she refused to miss a cue and gave every ounce of effort she could give. Jamie was not the only student who battled illness this past weekend, but she certainly led by her courageous example. Great respect and high praise to those who gave life this past weekend to the long used but apt cliché, "The Show Must Go On!" An argument could be made for better use of understudies, but then we wouldn't have benefited from the pathos and inspiration of watching young people rise above their physical frailties and force their will upon their bodies.

In his famous work, "If", Rudyard Kipling challenges his youthful reader with these words: "If you can force your heart and nerve and sinew to serve your turn long after they are done, and so go on when there is nothing in you, except the will which says to them, 'Hold On,' ...yours is the world and everything that is in it, and what is more, you will be a man – my son." Our fourth graders memorize those words. Our eighth graders memorize them again. Our constant hope is that our students, alumni and friends – and we ourselves - will live such words daily. More often than not, such exploits go unnoticed by all but God. Yet it is cause for great joy when He allows us to witness real life examples like Jamie and friends who force their will upon their bodies to "hold on" for the sake of whatever may be the event or cause of the moment.

PRACTICE FIELD UPDATE

It appears at this time that the grass on the new practice field will not be established enough to allow soccer practice at the beginning of the girls season. Providing there is no winter kill and we receive adequate spring rains; there is a possibility that the field could be used after 3 or 4 mowings. We appreciate so much the efforts of Richard Ramshaw in preparing and planting the field, and it is important that we not destroy the grass before it has a chance to become a usable turf. The girls soccer team is scheduled to practice on the KNI fields as they have done in past years.

TUITION ASSISTANCE FOR 2007-08 SCHOOL YEAR

Tuition Assistance will again be available to new and returning families based upon financial need; most families qualify with either: 1) "adjusted gross income" under \$42,000, or 2) tuition greater than 10% of "adjusted gross income".

CPLS utilizes Family Financial Needs Assessment (FFNA), an objective third party, to process the applications and assess each family's financial situation. We will then divide the Tuition Assistance funds available, based upon FFNA's recommendations, among those families who qualify in time to be considered. In order to apply for tuition assistance for the 2007-2008 school year, families must have their 2006 Federal Income Tax Return completed by the application deadline.

Based on the processing times for each type of application and our goal to communicate awards to families by Monday, April 23, we have established the following deadlines:

Regular Processing, USPS, application & tax return must be received by FFNA by March 2, 2007 (Fee payable to FFNA \$20)

Regular Processing, on-line, application & tax return must be received by FFNA by March 16, 2007 (Fee payable to FFNA \$30)

Fastback Processing, on-line or USPS, application & tax return must be received by FFNA by March 30, 2007 (Fee payable to FFNA \$40)

Applications are available now from Shirley Price in the business office; if you apply on-line (www.ffna1.com) you will not need a paper application form. You may want to visit FFNA's web site for general information about the application process. If you have any other questions regarding tuition assistance, please contact Shirley (or Bob Hannibal) at the school.

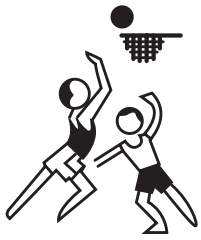

CPLS PTF MINUTES - JANUARY 12, 2007

Members Present: Edye Freund, Sara Cook, Jaye Conner, Sandra Fienhage, Cindy Cox, Shari Albrecht, John McFarland

Edye, Acting President, called the meeting to order and Sandra opened us in prayer.

Sara read the minutes from the December meeting. They were approved as amended.

Treasurer's Report - Jaye Conner

Jaye presented financial reports (see attached) year to date.

In summary: \$13,113.00 cash on hand

 - 8,306.26 in restricted funds

 \$ 2,733.06 available funds

The Treasurer's report was accepted by consensus and filed.

Presidents-Elect's Report – Edye Freund: Edye presented an updated Wish List report (attached). She also noted that a previous order for D. Hass from Classroom Direct was cancelled. To date, \$769.99 has been spent out of the Wish List fund and \$64.07 spent out of Board approved expenses.

School Administrator's Report – John McFarland: Mr. McFarland expressed his appreciation for the two drinking fountains installed. He has heard lots of positive feedback from the students.

Middle School Representative – Sandra Fienhage: She reported in effort to improve communication and understanding with the faculty, she emailed the middle school teachers introducing herself and her position in PTF and received some feedback from teachers. She presented Mrs. Greene's request for a dolly for the theatre keyboard. The committee agreed it would be OK to purchase this item even if the amount takes Mrs. Greene over the remaining wish list funds she has available.

Fundraising Coordinator – Cindy Cox: (Report under New Business)

Unfinished Business

PTF Audit – Jaye reported that C. Lippe and A. Conroy have completed the audit for the PTF records from the year 2005-06. They hope to have a written report by February.

Vision Screening - Sara reported that a tentative date has been set for Friday, Feb. 2 for the vision screening for grades K-6; 7th-12th graders by request from parents. Two doctors have agreed to do the exams and she is in contact with a third doctor. It may be necessary to split the screening into two days due to increase in number of students and doctors' availability. She will be working with teachers to work out a schedule.

New Business

Cookie Dough Fundraiser – Cindy Cox: Cindy presented information from a couple of different companies. She suggested we continue with the same company as last year. This fundraiser has been earmarked as a capital improvement fund for playground improvements with our goal of raising at least \$10,000. Last year we made \$3,644. Shari mentioned that a proposal to the Board will need to be completed since we made over \$2,000. Their next meeting is Jan. 23, 2007. Mr. McFarland will put it on his agenda items to present to the Board. He gave us a current copy of the fund raising policy and notes that we will need to ask for an exception to the four-month deadline.

Cindy will go ahead and order fliers. The PTF Board is in agreement to cover the cost of the fliers if the Board doesn't approve this fundraiser. Sandra made a motion to do the cookie dough fundraiser this spring and to spend up to \$200 for incentive and expenses pending Board approval. Jaye seconded. Motion passed.

The next meeting will be Friday, Feb. 9, 2007 at 1:30 pm at the Daycare House.

With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 3:00 pm.
